Zanetti Monday Missive 2021.12.13 A Winter Olympic Boycott?

Last week I read in the Wall Street Journal that the Biden administration is planning a diplomatic boycott of the Beijing Winter Olympics. Japan's Prime Minister announced they are drastically ramping up their military: "In order to safeguard the people's lives and livelihoods, we will examine all the options, including the capability to attack enemy

bases... and fundamentally strengthen our defense posture with a sense of speed."

Well, it looks like Japan is no longer assuming that the US can or will safely protect them. And they're not relying on Olympic Diplomatic Boycotts to communicate that message.
